To Whom It May Concern:

This is a request under the Freedom of Information Act. I hereby request the following records:

Records relating to or mentioning Project MOCKINGBIRD, telephonic surveillance of Robert S. Allen and Paul J. Scott. The existence of the program has been declassified and acknowledged by the Agency in the Family Jewels, with additional details being released by the National Archives (attached).

I am a member of the news media and request classification as such. I have previously written about the government and its activities for AND Magazine, MuckRock and Glomar Disclosure and have an open arrangement with each. My articles have been widely read, with some reaching over 100,000 readers. As such, as I have a reasonable expectation of publication and my editorial and writing skills are well established. In addition, I discuss and comment on the files online and make them available through the non-profit Internet Archive, disseminating them to a large audience. While my research is not limited to this, a great deal of it, including this, focuses on the activities and attitudes of the government itself. As such, it is not necessary for me to demonstrate the relevance of this particular subject in advance. Additionally, case law states that "proof of the ability to disseminate the released information to a broad cross-section of the public is not required." Judicial Watch, Inc. v. Dep't of Justice, 365 F.3d 1108, 1126 (D.C. Cir. 2004); see Carney v. U.S. Dep't of Justice, 19 F.3d 807, 814-15 (2d Cir. 1994). Further, courts have held that "qualified because it also had "firm" plans to "publish a number of . . . 'document sets'" concerning United States foreign and national security policy." Under this criteria, as well, I qualify as a member of the news media. Additionally, courts have held that the news media status "focuses on the nature of the requester, not its request. The provision requires that the request be "made by" a representative of the news media. Id. § 552(a)(4)(A)(ii)(II). A newspaper reporter, for example, is a representative of the news media regardless of how much interest there is in the story for which he or she is requesting information." As such, the details of the request itself are moot for the purposes of determining the appropriate fee category. As such, my primary purpose is to inform about government activities by reporting on it and making the raw data available and I therefore request that fees be waived.

The requested documents will be made available to the general public, and this request is not being made for commercial purposes.

In the event that there are fees, I would be grateful if you would inform me of the total charges in advance of fulfilling my request. I would prefer the request filled electronically, by e-mail attachment if available or CD-ROM if not.

Thank you in advance for your anticipated cooperation in this matter. I look forward to receiving your response to this request within 20 business days, as the statute requires.

This is a final response to your 27 February 2018 Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request for records relating to or mentioning Project MOCKINGBIRD, telephonic surveillance of Robert S. Allen and Paul J. Scott. We processed your request in accordance with the FOIA, 5 U.S.C. § 552, as amended, and the CIA Information Act, 50 U.S.C. § 3141, as amended.

We completed a thorough search for records responsive to your request and located 15 documents which we can release in segregable form with deletions made on the basis of FOIA exemptions (b)(1), (b)(3), (b)(6), and (b)(7)(c). Exemption (b)(3) pertains to information exempt from disclosure by statute. The relevant statutes are Section 6 of the Central Intelligence Agency Act of 1949, as amended, Section 102A(i)(l) of the National Security Act of 1947, as amended, and 10 U.S.C. 424. Copies of the documents are enclosed at Tab A. Additionally, we conducted a search of our previously released database and located three documents, copies of which are enclosed at Tab B. We enclosed only the two responsive pages of document C01283341. The complete version of this document totals over 700 pages; please let us know if you would like the entire document.

As the CIA Information and Privacy Coordinator, I am the CIA official responsible for this determination. You have the right to appeal this response to the Agency Release Panel, in my care, within 90 days from the date of this letter. Please include the basis of your appeal.

Please be advised that you may seek dispute resolution services from the CIA's FOIA Public Liaison or from the Office of Government Information Services (OGIS) of the National Archives and Records Administration. OGIS offers mediation services to help resolve disputes between FOIA requesters and Federal agencies. Please note, contacting CIA's FOIA Public Liaison or OGIS does not affect your right to pursue an administrative appeal.

SUBJECT: Project Mockingbird

Background:

Routine review of the daily syndicated column of newsmen Robert S. Allen and Paul J. Scott in early 1962 developed indications that classified information, sometimes code word material, was being utilized as the basis for a high percentage of their columns. Although much of the information contained in the columns was garbled, it was apparent that key points were frequently direct quotes from classified reports and summaries of recent vintage.

The Director of Security received a requirement from the DCI in March 1962 to attempt through appropriate investigative activity to determine, if possible, the identities of the source or sources of classified information to the two newsmen.

it was recommended to the DCI that telephonic monitoring would be the (b)(3)most productive. In addition, certain investigation limited to discreet checks of records sources was recommended. With approval of the DCI, around the clock telephone monitoring was conducted of telephone lines to each of the

newsmen's homes and to the office which they shared jointly.

The activity was continued until mid-June 1962, at which time the telaphonic coverage was discontinued to coincide with the retirement of the Director Knowledge of the activity, beyond a limited few in the Office of Security directly involved in processing the acquired data, is indicated as being limited to the DCI, the DDCI, the Executive Director-Comptroller and the General Counsel. Subsequently the DCI advised that he had briefed the Attorney General, the Secretary of Defense and the Director of the Defense Intelligence Agency. Regular briefings of the DCI were conducted by the Director of Security throughout the tunure of the operation.

Information Developed:

Project Mockingbird was extremely productive in developing sources of data, both classified and unclassified, to the two newsmen, as a result of a daily telephone conversation the two men would conduct after the senior member of the team, Col. Robert S. Allen, would complete the re-write of raw data left for him in the office by Paul J. Scott. It became apparent that Scott acquired most of the sensitive data, and that he acquired it in highly accurate form. The obvious garbling of the data occurred in the re-write by Col. Allen. At first it was believed that the garbling was a by-product of Col. Allen's regular state of intoxication; however,

The newsmen's sources were wide-ranging, and much of the information provided to them by these sources never saw print. In a number of cases the writers specifically noted that such-and-such an item could not be used in any form because it could be directly attributed to the source.

During its short tenure, MOCKINGBIRD established the identities of a significant number of sources and "cooperative" individuals. Much of this information was of a partisan political nature or was in the nature

direct interest to the purpose of MOCKINGBIRD, i.e. national defense information, it was possible in many cases to establish a specific identity of the source providing the information. In other cases, it was possible to establish only a general, non-specific, identification of source, such as "my friends over in Navy," "he works right in their office," etc. Because of the frequent compromise of sources by the newsmen, either by name or essential elements which could lead to identification of an individual, it became apparent that over an extended period of time most, if not all, such sources could be identified. (As noted earlier, it was decided to terminate MOCKINGBIRD with the retirement of the Director of Security, rather than to continue the activity for a more desirable period of time.)

Sources of information of all sorts used by Col. Allen and Scott can be generalized as follows:

Members of the Senate and House of Representatives
Congressional Staff members
Members of the News Media
Employees and staff members of the White House, the Department
of State, the Department of Defense, the Agency for International

The Republican and Democratic National Committees
Lobbyists
Retired Federal officers and officials
Miscellaneous others, ranging from a union official to a priest

There appeared to be a fairly clear division of source types between Col. Allen and Paul Scott, which might be generalized as follows:

a. Col. Allen appeared to have most of his contacts among former

Army associates and Col. Kehm, for example)

and "old New Deal" personalities, (Oscar Chapman, for example).

b. Paul Scott, by far the most active of the two men, had the remaining contacts. Monitors of MOCKINGBIRD were frequently amazed at the sheer bulk of information Scott would acquire in the course of a day. Most of the highly classified information mentioned as such in the conversations is directly attributable to Scott's sources. Scott made frequent reference to his close association with the Speaker of the House, and in one discussion with his White House source promised a "McCormack cigar" in exchange for a report he subsequently received from White House records. (Scott had taken a leave of absence from the column the previous year to assist in the unsuccessful political bid of the Speaker's nephew.)

MOCKINGBIRD was not successful during its three months of operation in identifying Col. Allen and Scott's source or sources in this Agency. The principle source of concern, Mr. "X", appeared to be in the Office of National Estimates. A blind memo regarding him, including references to his written comments on certain National Estimates and statements he is supposed to have made, was shown by the Director of Security to Mr. Sherman Kent. Mr. Kent was not aware of MOCKINGBIRD as the source. Mr. Kent subsequently advised the Director of Security that he was unable to identify "Mr. X" from the information provided.

One significant factor developed by MOCKINGBIRD was the ability of the newsmen to obtain warnings or guidance regarding possible threats to their activities. For example:

a. In mid-March 1962, Paul Scott advised Col. Allen that they were under investigation by the Air Force Office of Special Investigations as a result of their accurate overflight stories. According to Scott, the Secretary of Defense had directed the Director of the Defense Intelligence Agency to conduct an investigation of the newsmen in an attempt to develop their sources. The Director of DIA subsequently held a meeting with regarding the pro-	(b)(3)
posed conduct of the investigation. A "friend" of Scott's was present in a office when a participant of the meeting was discussing it with other	(b)(3)
personnel. Because there were too many people present at the time, the "friend" was unable to obtain full details. Subsequently, the "friend" was	(0)(0)

b. In May 1962, Col. Allen indicated that he had recently been visited by a man from CIA, an old Army friend, "Stanley." The apparent tenor of of the meeting dealt with "pot shots" being taken at the DCI and the DCI's concern that the Administration was planning to "unload him or kick him upstairs." In a subsequent conversation, Paul Scott advised Col. Allen upstairs." In a subsequent conversation, Paul Scott advised Col. Allen that he (Scott) had been cautioned to be a little careful in what he said to "Col. Grogan." Col. Grogan, he said, is very close to another person in CIA, with loyalty like that to Mr. McCone. Scott indicated that his source had advised that Col. Grogan had "a couple of meetings" with this other, unnamed, person "this week," and that Col. Grogan's visits to Col. Allen "rmay be both friendly and a surveillance job." (Col. Grogan was not aware of MOCKINGBIRD, but was cooperating with the Director of Security because of the mutual concern at Col. Allen and Scott's classified revelations. He, indeed, had met with the Director of Security both prior to and after his visit to Col. Allen.) Scott's source of this information was never identified.

Attached is a list of contacts and sources of Col. Allen and Paul Scott. Those indicated by an asterisk provided information to them, ranging from incidental political data to sensitive military information. Parenthetical numbers indicate a specific report in the attached MOCKINGBIRD notebook. Those for which no number appears are those persons identified in other conversations. These latter conversations were not transcribed because they did not deal directly with the information leakage of concern.



SUBJECT: Articles by Faul Scott and Robert Allen

- 1. In reference to the recent articles attacking Cord Meyer in the Paul Scott Column, Cord Meyer related the following. Charles Bartlett of the Chattanooga Times is a personal friend of Cord Meyer. Bartlett talked to Paul Scott and Scott indicated that his source was internal in CIA. (When Col. Grogan talked to Eartlett, it appeared that Bartlett was under the impression that the source might be within CIA, which was not nearly as positive as the reaction feceived Cord Meyer).
- 2. It is further stated that the individual feels that the Agency is being improperly operated, and that some of its activities are dangerous to the country. Scott informed Eartlett that he has material for three new columns as follows:
 - (1) That the Agency contributed money to a political command to defeat a Congressmen.
 - (2) That Cord Meyer's operation financed the trip of Owen Lettimore to Outer Mongolia.
 - (3) That there are tuelve Communist within CIA.
- 3. When Grogen talked to Eartlett, he suggested that Scott come to see Grogen and/or Mr. McCope, and make known the identities of the alleged twelve Communist in CIA. Grogen doubts that this will occur. Further, when Eartlett talked to Paul Scott regarding the recent article on Cord Meyer, he showed Scott the copy of the article (ASS), repeating Scott's information to Europe where they play on the financing of the Socialist movements. Eartlett endeavored to convey that Scott was doing disservice to this Government and the Intelligence.

 Committee. Reportedly this shook Scott up a bit.

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4. Grogan has a number of letters addressed to Mr. McCome from the West Coast indicating that they are accepting the Scott articles as the truth and are reacting to the effect that Mr. McCome is cleaning up the Agency. The impact of the articles is that they represent a true state of affairs.

SUBJECT: Article by Robert S. Allen and Paul Scott

- There is attached a thermofax of the 29 November 1951 article by Robert S. Allen and Paul Scott entitled "New Chief of CIA Cracks Down on Unvouchered \$\$". It should be noted that there are handwritten comments beside the different paragraphs in this article which were made by Mr. McCone indicating his knowledge or statements concerning these items.
- 2. Of significance herein are the statements or reactions of Mr. McCone to programs, factors, etc. occurring within the Agency. In some instances Mr. McCone has made statements which are reflected in substance in the article. In other paragraphs there are statements which Mr. McCone labeled completely wrong or erroneous. In other instances Mr. McCone indicates that he had no knowledge of the matter and obviously could not have a reaction.
- In paragraph (1) Mr. McCone has cautiously expressed an opinion which might be construed as the substance for this paragraph.
 - 4. Paragraph (2) is labeled as completely wrong.
- 5. Paragraph (3) "expressed surprise at support of some items but not conferences - 12 to 15 persons heard my (?) musings". Colonel Grogan will confer with Mr. McCone upon his return from the West Coast in an effort to obtain the identity of the 12 to 15 persons.
 - 6. Paragraphs (4) and (5) are labeled erroneous.
- Paragraphs (6), (7), and (8) labeled all new--no prior knowledge.

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- 8. Paragraphs (9), (10), (11), (12), and (13) entitled "Another Time Bomb Lighted".
- 9. From the comments noted by Mr. McCons it would appear that there is some substance to these paragraphs as set forth in the Allen-Scott column.
- articles by Scott and Allen it would appear that a source has been developed by Scott (who is actually writing these columns) which source has current and past knowledge of internal CIA events and activities. Some of the items appearing in these columns clearly show a knowledge of detailed facts not generally known. This would indicate quite possibly that Scott has a current source within CIA. Apropos of paragraphs (6), (7), and (8) above, which Mr. McCone indicated no knowledge of, it might be that the source, playing a cleaver game, is endeavoring to bring to Mr. McCone's and public attention these facts or statements through the medium of this column with the possible belief or supposition that some form of inquiry into these matters would be made by Mr. McCone.

SUBJECT : Scott-Allen Allegations About Peter Sichel

- 1. This memorandum is for information only.
- 2. It was originally alleged by Scott and Allen that they had furnished to the FBI the names of eight alleged Communists in CIA. We contacted the FBI and they stated that they had no record of any such lists. The FBI was then requested to contact Scott and Allen and to obtain the names of the eight alleged persons and the basis for the allegations.
- 3. Scott and Allen were contacted and stated that after having contacted their original source they had decided to give one name, that of Peter Sichel, and to wait and see what happened regarding him.
- 4. As a matter of information Peter Sichel is no longer an employee of this Agency having resigned 22 January 1960 to reenter his family business in New York. Sichel was the subject of an Employment Review Board hearing in 1956 which convened at the request of the DCI, Mr. Dulles, to consider a number of allegations which had been made against him several of which stemmed from persons in the Army. General Arthur Trudeau is said to have been one of the persons bringing Mr. Sichel's name to the attention of the Task Force.

6. Investigation is being conducted to determine the possible sources of the allegations to Allen and Scott regarding Mr. Sichel.

As is apparent from the above, he has a number of enemies in the intelligence community.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE RECORD

SUBJECT: Paul Scott

- 1. I had requested of Mr. Papich, FBI Liaison Officer, that the FBI contact Paul Scott to obtain from him the identity of his informant or the names of the persons alleged to be Communists within the CIA. Mr. Papich, on 12 February 1962 advised that the Bureau will contact Paul Scott in this regard.
- 2. As background for the above, it was reported that Paul Scott had the names of 12 persons in GIA who are reported to be Communists. Colonel Grogan contacted Paul Scott and asked him for the identity of the twelve persons. Scott advised that he had the names of eight such persons not twelve and that he could not release these until he checked with his informant. Later, Colonel Grogan called Scott again and Scott advised that his informant did not approve the release of the names or even one name in that he distrusted CIA. Scott advised that his informant had made known these names to both the FBI and the HCUA. A check of both the FBI and the HCUA failed to reveal that any person had come forward with information pertaining to eight Communists within CIA. In light of the negative findings, I made an official request of the FBI to interview Paul Scott to obtain these names.

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ALLEGATIONS BY SCOTT AND ALLEN REGARDING CLA

. The following allegations have either appeared in print or have been made verbally by SCOTT and ALLEN about the Agency:

1. SOUTT told Colored GROGAN and Charles BARTIETT that he had been told there were eight to twelve Commists in the Agency. When inter-viewed by Colonel GROGAN, SCOTT said he had no "release from his informent but would ask his most "creditable source" to furnish one name so it could be given to Colonel GROGAT and would see what action CIA would take.

This allegation snacks of James KELLIS; old allegation that there were twelve or thirteen Communists in CIA, none of which allegations stood up under investigation. A copy of KELLIS' old allegation is attached as Attachment A.

- 2. SCOTT alleged to GROGAN that CIA tried to influence the outcome of a Congressional election. This again sounds like James KHIJJS.
- 3. SCOTT and ALLEM have referred in their column to "Case No. 1 as allegedly involving a CIA exent now in Lordon being treated, who claims to be suffering from fatigue and a bad case or nerves. One U. S. Azency suspects him of being a double agent or under the influence of Communist blackwail. He is balking all efforts of U. S. offers to return him on the grounds he is too sick to travel." This sounds like Tyle MUNSON's often repeated theme that Mr. Frank WISHER is a double agent or under the influence of Communist blackwail. A confidential source has advised that Lyle MUNSON has been in extensive contact with Senator Strom THIRPOND regarding the WALKER Case and has tried to promote the idea that the Overseas Weekly, which first surfaced the WALKER Case, was a CIA cover company. Another confidential source advised that Lyle MUNSON, when he contacts Senator THURNDID's office, contacts J. Fred HUZHARDT. This same source states that MINISON was believed to have been responsible for placing Cunther HARTELL as an employee in Senator Strom THUREDND's office. HARTFILL, according to the story, was formerly employed by U. S. Intelligence in Germany. He formerly worked for Army G-2 Headquarters on Brainwashing matters.

It seems likely to the writer that MUNSON would unload his other grievances against the Agency on Senator THURNDND including his grievance about Frank WISNER and that this may be a channel by which SCOTT has received this information. SCOTTS column on this allegation made the further statement that "also the Justice Department is investigating the case of CIA agent No. 1 after it was brought to their attention by sources other than the CIA." It has previously been reported that MUNISON is very close to Lou NICEOLS and to certain FBI representatives in New York -City, and that in December 1958, FRI representatives visited Lyle MUNSON in New York City and told him that they were investigating WISIGR and his mental condition.

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- 4. SCOTT and ALLEN in their October 25. 1961 column stated "CIA Agent No. 2 this covert operative who had held hav positions within the CIA who is believed to be involved in a raidr pusicess transaction. All wife is known to have decosited more than one million collars in personal funds in a Swiss here, where the CIA and the Soviets are known to keep have decosits for their covert and intelligence operations. The where-should of this exent who is refusing to return is known to too CIA."

 Investigation is still continuing to establish the identity of the person referred to.
- 5. SCOTT claims that one of the foundations which financed Oven LATTIMORE's trib to Outer Mongolia received contributions from CLA. The Owen LATTIMORE case and his connection with IPR is an old theme of Robert MORRIS who held extensive hearing on that case in the Senate Internal Security Committee in the mid 1950's.

IATTIMORE visited Outer Mongolis and returned to the United States on October 2, 1961 after six weeks stay, returning via Europe. He went under the suspices of the WENER-CREM Foundation for Anthropological Research in New York City and under the suspices of the American Philosophical Society; which were financed by CIA. 1855.

The State Department reportedly had under study the recognition of Outer Mongolia this summer. Senstor ENTERIS was vehamently opposed to the recognition of Outer Mongolia, and reportedly forced a State Department position opposing its recognition.

6. Representative Bruce ALGER (R.) of Texas was quoted by the Associated Press as saying "lines of communication for the CLA are heavily infiltrated by the Communists." SCOTT, when questioned by GROGAN, said ALGER was referring to MSA.

Bruce ALGER, the representative from Dallas, is a member of extreme right wing circles and is believed to be known to Robert MORRIS who is President of the Dallas University. It is a possibility that MORRIS may be the source of this allegation.

7. According to ALLEN and SCOTT's column the DCI McCONE "is making a first hand survey of the Agency Estimates Division headed by Sherman KEMP, looking over their reports to determine their accuracy and impact on U. S. foreign policy, especially U. S. - Soviet relations. This has touched off secret meetings between CLA officials and members of the State Department Policy Planning Staff. These officials are concerned that they will lose control of estimates on which colicy is being based if McCOUE decides to check up on these dividors. If this should hapten the stage would be set for a complete re-study of U. S. policy toward the doviet. Chinese Communist Bloc and why these colicies have failed to strongthen the tide of international Communism."

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It is worth noting that the State Department Policy Planning Staff, when it was headed by Robert BOWIE in 1956, was a favorite target of MORRIS because of BOWIE's association with Owen LATTIMORE. In addition, ALLEN'S column of Movember 6, 1961 stated that the National Security Council policy of U. S. aid to Yugoslavia was written by Robert BOWIE and that approval of that National Security Council order of July 18, 1956 was predicated on a CIA report prepared by Robert AMORY and Sherman KENT.

The U. S. aid to Yugoslavia is currently a top target of the extreme right wing and particularly those Texas elements who are opposed to Yugoslav jet pilot training at an air base in Paris, Texas. As a result of these protests, further pilot training was terminated in mid-December 1961 at the request of a Yugoslav Defense Ministry official.

In addition, it is worth noting that Rober ANORY has been a favorite target of the extreme right wing who have quoted him as saying in the past that Red China should be recognized and seated in the U. N. A copy of ALLEN and SCOTT's article is attached as Attachment B.

8. SCOTT and ALLEM in their columns have stated that Cord MEYER is in charge of unvouchered funds in CIA and had spent over four million dollars in the past year; that Mr. McCONE was disturbed at Cord MEYER funding Socialist conferences in Europe; and MEYER's background was set forth in the column important the fact that he was formerly head of the United World Federalists.

It may or may, not be released that Cord NEYER in 1954 furnished a loyalty affidavit in Jessie McKNIGHT, a State Department official then under investigation. McKNIGHT at that period was a target of investigation by Robert MORRIS who, at the time, was Executive Director of the Senate Internal Security Committee.

It is also noteworthy that MEYER's name and his connection with United World Federalists and CIA have appeared in Facts Forum, a text published and put out by H. L. HUNT, Texas oil man, and Blair more , both active in right wing circles.

- SCOTT alleged that "some of the CIA estimates on East Germany
 were poor ones particularly in view of what has happened in East Germany".
 Further investigation will be required on this allegation.
- 10. SCOTT said that he had read the executive session testimony of General Bedell SNUTH in which SNUTH, according to SCOTT, claimed that CIA had been penetrated.

What SCOTT was referring to was General SMITH's testimony of October 13, 1952 before the ECUA in which he stated that the Agency must assume that it is penetrated and work from that premise, and second that there had been


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some agent type operation oversess which had been found to be Soviet intelligence controlled. These are the statements which General SATA made in the open session. It is not known whether testimony was given in executive session, but it seems quite clear from the open session testimony that executive session testimony, if any, would not have been joint beyond that just described.

- The possibility exists that William P. Connors, Press Release Section, White House, might be the source of some of the classified information appearing from time to time in the column Allen-Scott Report, written by Robert S. Allen and Paul Scott.
- A confidential source has advised that during the Spring of 1963, he learned that William P. Connors, then a clerk in the White House file room, had provided Paul J. Scott, one of the writers of the Allen-Scott Report, with information from White House files.
- 3. Source stated that as he recalls it, Scott was most interested in obtaining a transcript of a talk given on foreign policy at Columbia University by Theodore Sorensen. Scott was unsuccessful in attempts to obtain a copy from Sorensen's office and other sources. Scott was aware that Sorensen planned to publish the talk in a series of syndicated articles and it was Scott's desire to publish the information in his column before Sorensen's articles came out.
- 4. At Scott's request, William Connors checked the White House files and found only one copy of the Sorensen presentation. He subsequently delivered the desired information to Scott's home.

5. Source stated that Scott and Connors are close friends.
William P. Connors' home is
and Scott lives nearby. Source also indicated that Connors' wile had
jokingly stated at one time that if Connors kept all the papers he brough
home from the White House, the home would look like the White House
trash room.

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6. Source stated that he had read about the concern over White House security in the papers and that he felt obligated to report this information. Source declined to clarify his relationship or interest in Connors and Scott any futher. He also indicated very strongly that he would not be available for further interviews regarding this matter.

SUBJECT: William P. Connors

This Agency is in possession of information from a source of known reliability which indicates that as of 20 May 1963 Paul J. Scott and Colonel Robert S. Allen, co-authors of the then syndicated "Allen-Scott Report" had an informant in the White House who was passing them material for publication.

According to our source one of the items passed to Scott was the text of a speech delivered by Theodore Sorenson at Columbia University. Scott claimed that Sorenson planned to use the text of the speech for at least two newspaper columns to be printed in the near future by the Washington Star and other newspapers. Both Scott and Allen planned to "scoop" Sorenson by publishing the same information in their syndicated column in advance of its public use by Sorenson.

Our source advised that Scott's informant in the White House, after several attempts, was able to secure a copy of the Sorenson speech and passed it to Scott on the evening of 22 May 1963. Our source does not remarker whether the text, in whole or in part, appeared in the Scott-Allen column, but offered the information that the Northern Virginia Sun, the only local paper carrying the column, offer disapped the column from the issues, presumably for editorial or policy reasons.

This is the only definitive leak of information from the White House of which our source had knowledge, however, he believes that the informant may have also passed Scott material known only as

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Charles and

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the "Rostow papers". Our source could not locate any of this information in Scott-Allen columns but gathered from discussions . between Scott and Allen that the information had been published and that Mr. Rostow was furious about it.

According to our source, the informant in the White House was Mr. William P. Connors, who in May of 1963 was a clerk in the White House file room. A credit inquiry made in 1962 was reviewed by this Agency and confirmed his employment by the White House at that time. Recent discreet inquiries reveal that he is currently employed in the Press Release Section.

Mr. Connors, his wife Jean, and currently reside at . One additional postiment bit of information provided by our source relates to a conversation he overheard between Scott and O'Connor's wife, Jean, in connection with the Sorenson text. Mrs. O'Connor told Scott that she hoped her husband had not brought the text into their home and she had thrown it out. She went on to say that, "Oh, if I kept all he brought home, it would look like the trash room of the White House."

NOTE: In 1968, Scott and Allen parted, and Allen added retired UPI reporter, John A. Goldsmith to his team, producing a renamed Allen-Goldsmith Report. Scott launched his own column for the Publishers-Hall Syndicate at that time.



SUBJECT: William P. CONNORS

A confidential source of known reliability, on 20 May 1963, advised that at 1350 hours that date, columnist Paul J. Scott briefed Col. Robert S. Allen, his co-author of the Allen-Scott Report syndicated column, Allen efforts to obtain material from the White House.

According to informant, Scott told Col. Allen that he was attempting to obtain the text of a presentation delivered at Columbia University by Theodore Sorenson of the Presidential staff. Scott indicated that Sorenson contemplated using the text of the presentation for at least two newspaper columns to be printed in the near future by the Washington Star and other newspapers. Scott indicated that he would like to put the text into the Scott-Allen Report prior to the appearance of the same information in the Sorenson columns. Col. Allen indicated he would be delighted to "jump the gun" on Sorenson, and send the column out as a "weekend special!" "That would make a hell of a good story," he told Scott.

Scott explained to Col. Allen that "this friend of mine who's right down there," had called Sorenson's office on two occasions for a copy of the speech, but had been told that the only copies of it are at Columbia University. Scott indicated that he believed this to be a'dodge," because of the contemplated publication of the Sorenson speeches in newspaper form.

Scott indicated that his source had told Sorenson's office, "We've got to have one for the file room," and Sorenson's office agreed to send a copy to the source.

Scott indicated he had spoken to his source about the matter over the weekend, and that his source would check on it that day and advise Scott that evening.

The foregoing exchange explained a conversation previously noted by the informant on 17 May, 1963. Informant advised that on 17 May 1963, Paul J. Scott had a conversation with Mrs. Jean Connors, who resided at Scott asked Mrs. Connors if

"Bill" was at home, and Mrs. Connors responded that he was not. She indicated that "Bill" was at a Bingo session. Scott told Mrs. Connors to tell Bill that Scott has'h McCormack cigar, if he's got a Sorenson speech." Mrs. Connors replied that she guessed it was worth it, and asked if Scott

was referring to any particular speech. Scott replied that he was interested in the one at Columbia University.

Mrs. Connors indicated she recalled the speech, noting that Bill had been carrying one around in the car, on the front seat, but did not know what Bill had done with it. She indicated that she hoped Bill had not brought it into the house and she had accidentally thrown it out. She told Scott, "Oh, if I kept all he brought home, it would look like the trash room of the White House."

Mrs. Connors agreed to look about the house for the speech, but Scott indicated it would not be necessary. The conversation then changed to church activities in which they shared a common interest. As they were concluding the conversation of church matters, Scott told Mrs. Connors to remind Bill that'the offer stands. " She again indicated her concern that she had accidentally thrown it out, and indicated that if such had been the case, Bill could get another one. She asked Scott if he needed the speech text "tonight." Scott replied that he didn't, and that "I've got plenty of . . . I was just going through my notes here, remembered that I had mentioned this here and I was..." The conversation then renewed on church activities, with Scott explaining about his contacts with Catholic officials on Cardinal Mindzenty and the lack of a firm position and all the confusion he had encountered. Scott concluded the discussion with the statement, "Well, you tell Bill that, with all these errors in the church, I at least gotta keep up on Sorenson. " Mrs. Connors replied, "Alright, you keep him straightened out and somebody else can straighten the church out. "

According to the informant, the next related conversation took place on 22 May 1963 at about 2230 hours. "Bill" asked Paul J. Scott if Scott was still up. When Scott indicated he was, "Bill" indicated that "I'll be over in a couple of minutes... I've got that thing for you." He then indicated that "Jean" wished to talk with Scott, and that he would leave for Scott's house while Scott and Jean were talking. The conversation between Jean and Scott dealt with a Story being written by Scott concerning an "inside" memo about preparation of the Pope's statement on Peace. The conversation concluded with no further reference to the Sorenson speech text.

The reference to the "McCormack cigar," according to the informant, deals with Scott's close relationship to Speaker of the House John McCormack. As background, the informant advised that Scott had earlier used the text of another Sorenson speech in launching an attack on Sorenson. Informant indicated that Sorenson subsequently used the first speech in basically unedited form in a series published on foreign policy in the Washington Star. Based on word count and the number of articles published, Scott believed that Sorenson would use the text of the second speech in another series of forthcoming articles on U.S. foreign policy, and desired to "scoop"Sorenson with the latter's own material. Informant gained the impression that "Bill" was

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also a possible source for Scott of the earlier Sorenson speech and for what Col. Allen and Paul Scott referred to as the "Rostow papers." Informant could not locate any published Allen-Scott Report column dealing with this topic, but gathered from discussions between Col. Allen and Scott that the information had been published and that Mr. Rostow was angered by it. /

Project MOCKINGBIRD

IDENTIFICATION:

Project MOCKINGBIRD, a telephone tap in 1963 of the homes and office of Robert S. Allen and Paul J. Scott, syndicated news columnists whose columns appear in the Northern Virginia Sun newspaper.

BACKGROUND

According to an undated and unsigned memorandum (Tab 1) in the Project MOCKINGBIRD file, routine review of the daily syndicated column of Scott and Allen in early 1962 developed indications that classified information, sometimes codeword material, was being utilized as the basis for a percentage of their columns, and although much of the information in the columns was garbled, it was apparent that key points were frequently direct quotes from classified reports and summaries of recent vintage. (While there are no copies of the columns available in the file, there are memoranda referring to some of the articles in question. These memoranda are attached as (Tab 2).

APPROVAL

(Tab 1) referred to above under Background indicates that the Director of Security received a requirement from the DCI in March 1962 to attempt, through appropriate investigative activity, to determine if possible the identities of the source or sources of the classified information to the newsmen.

recommended to the DCI that telephone
monitoring would be productive. According
to the (Tab 1) memorandum, the DCI approved
the telephone monitoring of each of the
newsmen's homes and the office which they
shared jointly. (Knowledge of the activity,
beyond a limited number of Office of Security

personnel, was limited in the Agency to the DCI, DDCI and Executive Director-Comptroller).

RESPONSIBILITY:

According to (Tab 1), the Office of Security had the responsibility for carrying out the operation. While the Office of Security, through the Director of Security, received a requirement from the DCI to attempt through investigative activity to determine the identities of the source or sources of information to the two newsmen, the Office of Security recommended to the DCI and received his approval to conduct telephone monitoring of the newsmen. There is no indication in the file relative to reporting arrangements, however, a former Office of Security employee familiar with the project and now assigned to another Agency component advised on 8 January

1975 that the project reporting and direction was carried out verbally.

THE OPERATION :

According to (Tab 1), the operation began in March 1962 and was discontinued in mid-June 1962 to coincide with the retirement of the D/OS. These times are at variance with logs housed in the Office of the Chief, SSD, which indicate that the operation began on 12 March 1963 and ended on 17 June 1963. As previously indicated, the telephones of the homes and the jointly shared office of the newsmen were tapped. There is no indication in the file or logs as to the location of the listening post and equipment. Coverage, according to the logs, was 24 hours a day.

RESULTS

According to (Tab 1), Project MOCKINGBIRD was extremely productive in developing sources of data, both classified and unclassified, to the newsmen. These sources are listed in (Tab 1) and (Tab 3). It is not clear from the record whether all of

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these sources were identified through the telephone tap. A detailed analysis of the surveillance logs might, however, resolve this question. The files contain transcripts of the telephone taps but there is no indication of any formal reports, attributable to the transcripts, being prepared for forwarding to higher authority, with the possible exception of the attached (Tab 4) memoranda. MOCKINGBIRD was not successful in identifying the source or sources of the newsmen in CIA,

On May 27 and June 2, the Senate Select Committee informed the Central Intelligence Agency of the Committee's plans for examining the field of foreign intelligence and the subject of covert action. In the area of the domestic activities of the Central Intelligence Agency, the Select Committee intends to address a wide range of issues, including the domestic aspects of CIA's foreign operations. The Committee intends to approach the issues of the CIA's domestic activities with a broad perspective, realizing, as I am sure you agree, that the threats to United States security and the need to protect sources and methods of intelligence, as well as CIA installations and personnel, cross our national borders.

Basically, the subjects of investigation fall into the following five headings:

- Counterintelligence activities at home and those counterintelligence activities abroad which involve American citizens, including activities undertaken pursuant to the Director's authority to protect intelligence sources and methods.
- Foreign intelligence activities at home and those foreign intelligence activities abroad which involved American citizens.
- The domestic operations of the CIA undertaken in support of activities abroad.

- Relationships between other organizations, public and private, and the CIA.
- The use of CIA personnel, funds, or facilities for purposes unrelated to its intelligence missions.

Within these broad subjects of investigation, the Committee will examine "questionable activities" by the CIA. These activities are those where there exist, in the words of the agreed upon Outline for Inquiry Procedures, "specific allegations of Agency or Executive Branch abuses or other controversial specific matters where there is reason to believe improprieties may have occurred". The following categories are believed by the Committee to be among those in which questionable activities have taken place:

In regard to each questionable activity chosen for study, the Select Committee will examine the nature of the activity and will attempt to evaluate the results. The Committee will also look at the CIA's authority to undertake the activity, the relationship between the activity and the CIA's missions, the internal mechanisms for initiation and review, and the external mechanisms for control of such activities.

Though the initial focus will be on the specific questionable activity, the Select Committee's inquiry is designed to reach fundamental issues which bear directly on the adequacy of the administrative organization and procedures of the CIA, and the legislation presently controlling the Agency. - What is the legal authority for CIA intelligence and counterintelligence activities within the United States? What is the legal authority for CIA actions directed at U. S. citizens abroad? Should the authority be clarified or revised?

What limitations are placed on CIA intelligence and counterintelligence activities directed at U. S. citizens abroad by the Constitutions and laws of the United States? Should the limitations be clarified or revised?
- 3. What have been the purposes and aims of CIA intelligence and counterintelligence activities within the United States or directed at U. S. citizens abroad? How were these objectives set? Were they appropriate? Should they be modified?
- 4. What is the origin and purpose of the charge to the Director, Central Intelligence, to protect intelligence sources and methods? What actions have been taken pursuant to it? Were those actions appropriate? Should the charge be clarified or revised? Should the DCI be provided with additional authority in order to carry out the charge?
- 5. What is the origin and purpose of the prohibition on CIA in respect to police and law enforcement powers, and internal security functions? Has this prohibition interferred with the DCI's charge to protect intelligence sources and methods? To what extent has this prohibition interferred with other duties and missions of the CIA? Should the prohibition be clarified or revised?
- 6. What have been or are now the methods and techniques of intelligence gathering and counterintelligence operations used by the CIA in the United States or directed at U. S. citizens abroad? What is the legal authority

for the use of each such technique? How was the use of each such technique authorized, reviewed, and controlled, internally and externally? What was the effectiveness of each such technique in achieving the missions of the CIA? Were any of these techniques used for any purpose other than one related to the CIA's lawful missions? - 7. What kinds of files have been maintained on U. S. citizens and organizations? What information was retained and for what reasons? Under what conditions and through what procedures should such material be collected or retained?
- 8. What was the nature of the threats which triggered CIA intelligence and counterintelligence activities within the United States or directed at U. S. citizens abroad? What was the basis for the CIA's estimates of the threats?
- How are the intelligence and counterintelligence activities of the CIA within the U. S. or directed at U. S. citizens abroad organized and coordinated with other agencies of government? What have been the practices and procedures for liaison, exchange of information, joint operation and mutual support between the CIA and other governmental bodies? To what extent did CIA coordination and cooperation with other government agencies result in questionable activities by the CIA; to what extent did the failure to cooperate or coordinate activities result in questionable activities by the CIA? How did the cooperation or coordination of activities with other governmental agencies relate to the prohibi-. tion on the CIA's exercise of police and law enforcement powers or internal security functions? Should the procedures and practices involving other governmental agencies be clarified or revised?

- 10. Have governmental officials outside the CIA sought and obtained the CIA's assistance for political purposes or personal advantage? To what extent have private organizations or individuals enjoyed special treatment or influence because of their involvement with CIA activities or their knowledge of such activities? What measures have been or should be taken to ensure that the CIA is not misused in such ways?
- 11. What have been the procedures and mechanisms within the CIA for initiating, reviewing, reporting, and controlling CIA intelligence or counterintelligence activities within the U. S. or directed at U. S. citizens abroad? How might these procedures be improved? What are the procedures and mechanisms external to the CIA for oversight of the CIA's intelligence and counterintelligence activities within the U. S. or directed at U. S. citizens abroad? How might these mechanisms and procedures be improved?

The annexed notifications set forth requests for additional documents and the names of persons the Committee presently desires to interview. In some cases the occupant of a position is not known to the Committee and the Committee requests that the CIA provide the name of the individual. In any case, where the individual is no longer with the Agency, the Committee requests that the CIA provide the individual's last known address. Finally, the notifications indicate the names of the staff members who, in addition to the Committee's senior staff, will be working in these areas.

The Committee, in the course of the next few months, will undertake other subjects for investigation as its work proceeds and will notify you as appropriate.

We look forward to your cooperation in these matters.

. This request calls for "all files" of various programs or projects, and "all files" regarding particular incidents or entities. Requests for "all files" are intended by the Committee to include all subject, correspondence chronological

and all other files or unfiled documentary materials in the office, or storage repositories, of the organizational unit which managed the program or project in question.

The requests also include all such files in the offices or storage repositories of the responsible Division Director, Office Director, and Directorate Deputy Director, in the DCI office, and in any other part of the Agency which had significant involvement or connection with the program.

Where the Committee requests "documents" or "documentary materials", those terms are defined as all correspondence, memoranda, notes, working papers, buck slips and routing slips, studies, reports, charts, films, tapes, and all other writings, printings, typings, or drafts, and copies or reproductions.

When files for a specific project or program are requested under the best known designation of that project or program, the request includes files of any earlier or later versions of that project. Thus, the request for



Finally, the notifications indicate the names of the staff members who, in addition to the Committee's senior staff, will be working in these areas.

The Committee, in the course of the next few months, will undertake other subjects for investigation as its work proceeds and will notify you as appropriate.

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ATTACHMENT I.

DOCUMENTS REQUESTED FOR STAFF REVIEW

This attachment lists files and other documentary materials which the Select Committee hereby requests be made available for staff review.

In the first instance, all of the specified material will be reviewed in unsanitized form by staff at CIA head-quarters. The Committee will continue to select particular documents to be transmitted to the Committee's offices in Washington to be used in preparing for hearings and the Committee's report.

In order to expedite production of the requested materials we have indicated, where known to the Committee, offices within the CIA which would be appropriate starting points to search for the materials. This effort to expedite matters does not limit the CIA's responsibility to search for such materials throughout the Agency, using as appropriate, lists and indices of CIA projects and programs.

. This request calls for "all files" of various programs or projects, and "all files" regarding particular incidents or entities. Requests for "all files" are intended by the Committee to include all subject, correspondence chronological

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and all other files or unfiled documentary materials in the office, or storage repositories, of the organizational unit which managed the program or project in question.

The requests also include all such files in the offices or storage repositories of the responsible Division Director, Office Director, and Directorate Deputy Director, in the DCI office, and in any other part of the Agency which had significant involvement or connection with the program.

Where the Committee requests "documents" or "documentary materials", those terms are defined as all correspondence, memoranda, notes, working papers, buck slips and routing slips, studies, reports, charts, films, tapes, and all other writings, printings, typings, or drafts, and copies or reproductions.

When files for a specific project or program are requested under the best known designation of that project or program, the request includes files of any earlier or later versions of that project. Thus, the request for Project MHCHAOS would also comprehend files for the ante-

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projects and for the subsequent

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When any files, portions thereof, or particular documentary materials are no longer available, the Committee

requests that they be specified with an accompanying explanation of when and under what circumstances they were destroyed. If no information regarding their destruction is available, please specify the earliest time, and under what circumstances, CIA first became aware the items were missing.

We expect that staff representatives of the Committee and of CIA will expedite compliance with these requests, and indicate priorities for production through preliminary review of this notification and discussion of the files involved. It would also be helpful if CIA identifies those persons within each Directorate and Division or Office who are actually in charge of reviewing and assembling material, so that Committee staff can also discuss these requests with them and resolve rapidly any questions or difficulties which might arise.

We also expect that a good deal of this material will be readily available in view of the reviews already done by CIA in this area over the past two years. As soon as some portions of any requests are available for review, the Committee staff should be notified in order that they may begin their inspection while the remainder is being assembled. - 4 -

Finally, it should be noted that this document request does not supersede any earlier requests for material in this area which are still outstanding. If CIA staff encounters overlap in responding to this and earlier requests, the Committee staff should be promptly notified.

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FILES

The following files are requested. In order to expedite their location, the Committee has indicated offices which appear to be the best starting point for a search. This does not limit, nor supersede the general guideline that all files throughout the CIA relating to a project be procured. If projects herein identified are not CIA projects, but are identifiable as projects of other agencies with which CIA had some connection, the request is for all CIA files regarding such projects.

In the first instance, all of the specified material will be reviewed in unsanitized form by staff at CIA headquarters. 

- 1. Reference is made to the request of the Associate Deputy Director for Administration for information concerning the identities of members of Congress who were in telephonic contact with either Scott or Allen during the course of our coverage of the latter two individuals.
- 2. This is to advise that a thorough search of available Project MOCKINGBIRD materials reflects the name of one Congressman, John McCormack, Democrat from Massachusetts, as having been in telephonic contact with Scott on 26 March 1963. This is the only record which reflects telephonic contact by a member of Congress.
- Attached is a Xerox copy of the log which includes the call from Representative McCormick to Scott. Neither the tape nor the complete transcript is available.

 Project MOCKINGBIRD was a telephone tap in 1963 of the homes and the office of Robert S. Allen and Paul J. Scott, syndicated news columnists whose columns appear in the Northern Virginia Sun newspaper. A summary of the Project was previously furnished to your office.

- 2. In compliance with your request, the following additional information is attached:
 - a. Tab A consists of reports described in the Project summary previously furnished to you as based on information provided to the reporters by specific representatives of the Senate and Congress. Where available, telephone tap logs pertaining to these reports are attached to the report itself. It should be noted that copies of the transcripts of the conversations upon which the reports are based are also attached to the reports.
 - b. Tab B consists of telephone tap logs showing actual conversations between either Robert S. Allen or Paul J. Scott and members of the House of Representatives.
 - of, or where available, transcripts of conversations between Scott or Allen or others wherein a member of the Senate or Congress are mentioned as a source of information.
- For your information, Adam, referred to in the attached logs and transcripts, is reporter Allen, and Sam is reporter Scott. It should also be noted that the Office

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of Security Project MOCKINGBIRD files, in addition to data previously furnished to your office, contains, for the most part, logs of telephone conversations with a brief indication of the conversation content, but the files do not contain either the tapes of the conversations or a complete transcript of all of the conversations.

- 4. There are numerous inferences in the telephone tap logs to Congressional sources of Scott and Allen, but there are no transcriptions or tapes available to substantiate this. A sample of this type of log is attached as Tab D. In the entry 1410-32 hours, a person identified as John could possibly be Representative John McCormack. Further in this log entry, a reference is made to Representative Michael Peighan implying that he is providing information, however, there is also the possibility that the information emanated from other sources. Without actual tapes or transcripts, no deductions as to sources relative to this type of log entry can be made.
- 5. Please advise if you desire any further information concerning this matter.







has advised that during recent discussions between ADAM and SAM the following points were noted: (b)(3)

- a. ADAM told his good-friend Mrs. Beehan that he had been visited by a man from CIA, an old Army friend, Stanley. (Col. Grogan). He told Mrs. Beehan that through certain newswen Administration circles were taking pot-shots at Mr. McCone and that Mr. McCone was concerned that they (the Administration) were planning to "unload him or kick him upstairs
- b. Col. Grogan contacted ARAM's secretary and gave her two unclassified references he had spoken to ARM about. One was on Defense Department appropriations and one was on a Vietnamese disputing Warren Unna's story (Unna's story per SAM was an administration leak)
- c. APAN thanked SAM for procuring the hearing on Defense Department appropriations. SAM sees several stories in it. One is that it gives the details for the first time on the Special Policy Committee. Per SAM Robert Remedy heads it but U. Alexis Johnson is chairman. Mr. McCone is on the committee. They are both intrigued that McCeorge Bundy is also on the committee.
- d. Sam stated to ADAM that he had been cautioned to be a little careful in what is said to Col. Grogan. Col. Grogan is very close to another person in CIA, with loyalty like that to Mr. McCone, and has had a couple of meetings with him this week. "This may be both friendly and a surveillance job." SAM did not wish to name this other person at the time, but knows his name.

SAM stated that "they" are especially concerned over the story about no further low-level flights over Cuba. SAM was told that Col Grogan will make frequent visits to them and will probably bring up the Cuban thing at a later meeting.

version, see. They have, we now have definate evidence, they have modified they've got a modified version of the SA-2 and the SA-3, which can knock down short range implicated balistic missiles. Now the only reason they can't knock down longer range is because they haven't got the radar tuned in to it yet, see. And now the same thing like a, so what do you do. You establish a tracking station in Cuba, you pick up and you get a fix on these things, then you radio this information to a control center in Moscow who then sends it to the missile site. And this is a matter of...

Seconds!

...seconds here, and then they can zero in with this thing. Now this is what's got the, why they set up that special sub-committee, is to see how, whether this link and whether the, waxwe're not delaying too long in putting our own in, because all this, they're going ahead with the refinement of their SA-2 and 3 rather than going to a new missile like we are. And I sat down with two people who know this radar thing backward and forward to be sure there was, to be sure; that this thing was very feasible, and they said this is the way this stuff works.

Well, I think that just a terrific story, when you got the pieces put together that Russia has made Cuba into a powerfull anti-missile base.

Outpost.

Outpost, huh. Whatevergant you want to call it, a base, outpost, ah, it's a base, it isn't an outpost, it's a base that's what it is.

They have one picture which shows a different type SA-2 than those they had, taken in this last parade down there, and they have never seen one of these modified ones up close and they believe this it it., because of the different type zer new fins put on the 3rd stages and maybe they're down there testing this thing out now, but the actual missile would still be in Russia, but the communications system wouldbe in Cuba.

Well, I think that's a terrific story. That's a hell of a story

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aggression is established. (Sounds like he wask reading this last sentence). There's about seven if's in theire, you got to have firm evidence, and direct aggression, you see, and then you got to go through the dawn CAS. I took this here as a ksiz basic thing from which our whole policy is formulated.

I heard Hotlett from 10 o'clock from down in Americ Costa Rica, the CBS guy, and hesaid that there's nothing going to be done, nothing of any real significance. This high-flown talk. He said they may, Kennedy may promise them some economic aid but he said this is just good-willing and, he didn't use the word grand-standing but that's what the idea is. And he said that these, Samoza of Nicquragua, and somebody from Guatemala, are champin as at the bit to go after Cuba and they were just being squelched, in effect. That's what's happending. Well, go ahead, if you can build up a good story on that.

I've got plenty of stuff on that this thing, I think it might be good to get it out of the way. This would be in addition to Cuba, it would be a missile story in there...

So its just a stand-off. Quid pro Quo now. That's where there's am another pay-off. Cuba's just paying off right down the line. Every day in every way. Yeh. Yeh, go shead.

Ah, Oh, Jackson said he had been getting quite a bit of mail from around the country on one of the columnsin which we mentioned him in connection with this missile thing.

Question #1 - Who approved it?

Answer:

There is an indication in a summary of the Project contained in our files (Attachment 1) that the Director of Security received a requirement from the DCI to attempt through investigation to determine the identities of the source or sources of classified information to the two newsman.

it was recommended to the DCI that telephone menitoring would be the most productive. With the approval of the DCI, according to the summary, around the clock telephone menitoring of each home and their joint office was conducted. There are no memoranda available documenting the operational approval or direction by signature.

Question #2 - How high up the line of approval?

Answer:

See answer to Question #1.

Question #3 - When we went to Attorney General -- What form did it take? Who? Spoken word -- formal?

Answer:

There is no formal memorandum on file documenting or substantiating the fact of a briefing of the Attorney General; however, there is mentioned in the attached unsigned and undated summary of the Project that the DCI briefed the Attorney General, the Secretary of Defense and the Director of the Defense Intelligence Agency.

Question #4 - How was McMamara approached? What was Secretary McHamara's reaction?

ARSWOT:

As indicated in the attached unsigned and undated summary of the Project, but with no other substantiating documentation, the DCI briefed the Secretary of Defense.

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Question #5 - How did we approach the telephone company?

Answer:

The files do not reflect this information.

Question #6 - How did they or we do it?

Answer:

The files do not reflect this information.

Question #7 - Do we still have the tapes or transcripts or take?

Answer:

There is a volume available containing legs and tape transcriptions from March to June 1963. (NOTE: The attached summary of the Project reflects that the Project began in March 1962 and ended in mid-June 1962. This is at variance with the dates of the logs and transcripts cited.)

Question #8 - Who did we identify that Allen and Scott have contacts with?

Answer:

A list of contacts developed at the time of the Project are attached. (Attachment 2)

Question #9 - What names are on the tapes?

Answer:

The tapes are not available, but there are available voluminous transcripts documenting telephone conversations and containing a variety of names. (Attachment 2)

Question #10 - What leaks led to surveillance action?

Answer:

It would appear that attached summary of articles would seem to be the type of information which led to the surveillance, but there is nothing in the files to substantiate this.

(Attachment 3)

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It is worth noting that the State Department Policy Planning Staff, when it was headed by Robert BOWIE in 1956, was a favorite target of MDRRIS because of BOWIE's association with Owen LATTIMORE. In addition, ALLEN's column of November 6, 1961 stated that the National Security Council policy of U. S. aid to Yugoslavia was written by Robert BOWIE and that approval of that National Security Council order of July 18, 1956 was predicated on a CIA report prepared by Robert ANDRY and Sherman KENT.

The U.S. aid to Yugoslavis is currently a top target of the extreme right wing and particularly those Texas elements who are opposed to Yugoslav jet pilot training at an air base in Paris, Texas. As a result of these protests, further pilot training was terminated in mid-December 1961 at the request of a Yugoslav Defense Ministry official.

In addition, it is worth noting that Rober AMDRY has been a favorite target of the extreme right wing who have quoted him as saying in the past that Red China should be recognized and seated in the U. N. A copy of ALLEN and SCOTT's article is attached as Attachment B.

8. SCOTT and ALIEN in their columns have stated that Cord MEYER is in charge of unvouchered funds in CIA and had spent over four million dollars in the past year; that Mr. McCONE was disturbed at Cord MEYER funding Socialist conferences in Europe; and MEYER's background was set forth in the column impression the fact that he was formerly head of the United World Federalists.

It may or may, not be relative that Cord MEYER in 1954 furnished a loyalty affidavit for Jessie McKNIGHT, a State Department official then under investigation. McKNIGHT at that period was a target of investigation by Robert MORRIS who, at the time, was Executive Director of the Senate Internal Security Committee.

It is also noteworthy that MEYER's name and his connection with United World Federalists and CIA have appeared in Facts Forum, a text published and put out by H. L. HUNT, Texas oil man, and Blair more, both active in right wing circles.

- 9. SCOTT alleged that "some of the CIA estimates on East Germany were poor ones particularly in view of what has happened in East Germany". Further investigation will be required on this allegation.
- 10. SCOTT said that he had read the executive session testimony of General Bedell SMITE in which SMITE, according to SCOTT, claimed that CIA had been penetrated.

What SCOTT was referring to was General SMITH's testimony of October 13, 1952 before the HCUA in which he stated that the Agency must assume that it is penetrated and work from that premise, and second that there had been

some agent type operation overseas which had been found to be Soviet intelligence controlled. These are the statements which General SMITH made in the open session. It is not known whether testimony was given in executive session, but it seems quite clear from the open session testimony that executive session testimony, if any, would not have been good beyond that just described.

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

INDEX TO DOMESTIC SURVEILLANCE MASTER SUMMARY

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

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Telephone intercept connections were installed at the newmen's office and at each of their homes, for a total of 3. The connections were established with the assistance of a telephone company official who responded to a personal request by the Director of Security, Col. Sheffield Edwards. Col. Edwards' authority for the activity was Mr. John A. McCone, Director of Central Intelligence. The latter conduct the activity in coordination with the Attorney General (Mr. Robert Kenr the Secretary of Defense (Mr. Robert McNamara), and the Director of the Defense Intelligence Agency (Gen. Joseph Carroll). In addition to Office of Security personnel directly involved in the intercepts and research of materials acquired therefrom, only 3. other Agency officials are on record as witting of the activity: the Deputy Director of Central Intelligence (General Marshall S. Carter), the Inspector General (Lyman Kirkpatrick) and the General Counsel. (Mr. Lawrence Houston).

The intercept activity was particularly productive in identifying con tacts of the newsmen, their method of operation and many of their sour of information. For example, it was determined that during the period received data from 13 newsmen, 12 of whom were identified; 12 senate and 6 members of Congress, all identified; 21 Congressional staff mer of whom 11 were identified; 16 government employees, including a staff member of the White House, members of the Vice President's office, a Assistant Attorney General, and other well-placed individuals. A numb of other sources were partfally or tentatively identified, but the short s of the activity precluded positive identification. It was observed that the these contacts the newsmen actually received more classified and officidata than they could use, and passed some of the stories to other newsmen release, establishing that many "leaks" appearing under other by-liwere actually from the sources of the target newsmen.

Since the termination of Project Mockingbird, those materials related to it which were retained, have been maintained under strict security a of two Office of Security professionals.
