Zoning Plan Strongly Opposed

A lively public hearing on the matter of zoning the Town of New Hartford ended last night in no formal expression of opinion although the majority of the 55 present were opposed to the project. Another meeting will be called by the Town Planning Committee and then the matter will be submitted to the Town Board for final decision, it was announced.

"This is a free country and I should like to keep it that way. I think zoning is unnecessary," said Dr. Herbert N. Squier, Third Ave., voiced the majority opinion of those in the Highway Building, Washington Mills.

"New Hartford is a free and very lovely township. None in our residential areas would sell property to anyone wanting to start a honky-tonk or beer-joint. We are protected by a natural pride in our community," Dr. Squier added. "We are not going to be free with a lot of zoning restrictions established."

ELMER ROBERTS, Tilden Ave., asked, "Who started this business? This is a free country. Let's keep it that way. If we have zoning and a board of appeals, we will have just one political mess after another."

"Zoning," he continued, "becomes a political football. It is accompanied by higher taxes. Many people have moved from Utica to New Hartford to escape these high taxes. Most residential developments already are restricted. Let's leave the rest of the people alone."

ROBERTS suggested the estimated costs of administering the proposed zoning program be presented at the next meeting. W. Elmer Bedford, Chadwick's, a representative of Dr. H. F. McDonald, Burstone Rd. and Champlain, pleaded several times that the zoning plan is still open to changes. He said:

"This is not our baby. The committee has been appointed to investigate the proposition. We're here to obtain a cross-section of your opinions. It may well be that the proposed map will be changed as a result of factors that have been brought out here tonight. By law, there must be

another meeting on this matter. The final decision rests with the Town Board."

FREDERICK H. BAIRD, senior planning technician, State Department of Commerce, pointed out "Zoning cannot change the present physical features of your property over night. Zoning will provide that the better qualities are retained. But there is no way a use which already is established can be thrown out."

Stephen Bogner, 1126 Pleasant, asked "What affect will zoning have on the assessment of our property? Is there a possibility that zoning will result in higher assessments? We are O.K. as we are now."

P. D. McCormack, surprised many when he said, "I maintain winter quarters for lions, tigers, elephants and other animals on Third Ave., just above Sedgwick Park. We have never had trouble. Your zoning plan would classify us as residential. Then we would have trouble. Zoning means gray for somebody, — the architects, the lawyers, or somebody."

AMONG THOSE who spoke against zoning program were: A. J. Scully, third Ave.; W. Elmer Bedford, Chadwick's, a representative of Dr. H. F. McDonald, Burstone Rd. and Champlain, pleaded several times that the zoning plan is still open to changes. He said:

Mr. and Mrs. Hugh G. Humphreys, Tibbitts Rd., New Hartford, had guests from Britain yesterday on their 40th wedding anniversary.

The guests were Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Roberts, Chester, England. Mrs. Roberts is Mr. Humphreys' first cousin. It is the couple's first visit to this country. Although they live in England, Mrs. Roberts said: "We are as Welsh as can be." Mr. Roberts said: "We belong to Wales."

Today they were guests of Mrs. Owen Humphreys, Waterville. They will go from there to Niagara Falls to visit relatives, then will start a train trip to California. They will break their journey at Spencerville, Ohio, where they have relatives they have not seen for 50 years.

IN CALIFORNIA they will go to the home of their nephew, Robert Jones, Oakland, where they expect to spend six months.

Mr. and Mrs. Roberts, who came over on the Queen Mary, said they were impressed by the famous Humphrey farm. They had seen many newspaper pictures and stories about it sent to them by the Humphreys, but it passed their expectations.

Mr. Roberts exclaimed over the 285 cultivated acres, the potato-storage barn with its 10,000-bushel capacity and the large dairy. "It is a community in itself," he said. "It is fine living here; much better than at home now."

MRS. ROBERTS added: "We eat as much as one meal here as we get in a week over there." She ran a nursing home in Chester from 1933 to last July.

She has helped bring 2,618 local express offices with its territories into the world in that nursing home. "Not a few of them were American soldier fathers," she said.
